Attendance policy: Attendance is mandatory! After two unexcused absences. Each additional absence will lower your final grade, by a half of a letter grade (50 points). Absences will not be excused without documentation and verifiable cause. My preference as an instructor is to be contacted prior to any absence by email. You must also contact your acting partner if you must be absent. Please consider the penalties of absences in relation to the class grade, before missing class. In this acting class your attendance and participation is mandatory, class exercises and projects are essential for your artistic enrichment. Remember if you are an absent actor in the professional world you will be replaced with another actor!

#### What this means is:

- After four absences total, you cannot earn a grade higher than a B after 100 points are deducted from your total final points. (If you were working at an A level)
- After six absences total, you cannot earn a grade higher than a C after 200 points are deducted from your total final points. (If you were working at an A level)
- To earn the total 200 points for attendance you must attend all classes, participate and be present.
- Each student is given two absences to be ill, have car trouble, and oversleep or to be somewhere else I do not excuse these items.
- Please contact me about your own hospitalization, a death in the family or religious holidays these must be verifiable for an excused absence. As well as any University documented absences.

• I will contact you if you are failing the class (this is often a result of too many absences or poor class work and conduct) and you will not be able to successfully complete the semester without a failing grade.

<u>Late or Missed work</u> will not be accepted without prior notification and arrangements. Performances are an important part of this class if you are not prepared to perform on a date that you are scheduled to perform, your final grade for late paper and performances will be lessened by 5 points each class period until completed or handed in.

<u>Tardiness:</u> Three instances of lateness equal one absence. Please be on time this is crucial! Very Crucial!

#### **UA Severe Weather Guidelines**

## Personal safety should dictate the actions that students and employees take.

- Classes will remain in session until the National Weather Service issues tornado warnings for the campus. In the case of a tornado warning, all University activities are automatically suspended, including all classes and laboratories.
- Please move immediately to the shelter or best available refuge area and remain there until the tornado warning has expired.
- Classes in session when the tornado warning is issued can resume immediately after the warning has expired at the discretion of the instructor.
- Classes that have not yet begun will resume 30 minutes after the tornado warning has expired provided at least half of the class period remains
- Encourage students in your classroom to follow these procedures by remaining in the building and going with you to a shelter or best available refuge area
- During a tornado warning, Crimson Ride will immediately suspend operations, and the driver will direct passengers to shelter in select buildings.

#### Remember, when severe weather strikes and the warning sirens sound:

- Go to the nearest shelter or best available refuge area.
- Stay tuned to radio or television stations for further weather statements.
- Remain inside until the severe weather threat has ended.

If a tornado warning is issued for the campus, students, employees and visitors will be notified using the methods listed below. If you receive notification of a tornado warning through any of these methods, move to safety immediately.

#### **Class Guidelines**

- Treat fellow acting classmates with respect.
- Embrace a positive attitude along with positive energy this will strengthen your acting work in and out of this
  class.
- Please dress in attire that is comfortable and will not constrict your movement NO JEANS- FLEXIBLE SHOES NO HEELS, no tight fitting clothing on warm-up/movement or floor work days
- No eating in class
- Do not work on other work during this class
- Bringing a water bottle to class is HIGHLY recommended
- Cell phones should be turned off and put away when you enter the classroom, any phone ringing/beeping/vibrating and, any attempts to make or receive a phone call or text during the class will result in one tardy.
- I do NOT want to see your cell phones during class time –NO TEXTING!
- Hats and or sunglasses should not be worn during class, while costume pieces are welcomed for scenes
- Gum chewing is NOT permitted, this will hinder vocal quality
- Tongue and lip jewelry will need to be removed when performing
- A friendly reminder that this is NOT a good semester to get a piercing in the tongue, nose, or lip
- This is a great semester to QUIT Smoking and Vaping—this will ruin your instrument as an actor/singer.
- Touch will be an element of this class as part of the semester; actor alignment and partner work will be explored during the semester. Please let me know if you have concerns about this prior.
- Adult language and themes are common in theatre and acting roles, please see me prior if you have concerns
  about this.

#### Written Assignment Guidelines:

- All written assignments should be typed: double spaced with 12 pt. Times New Roman font
- I will NOT accept emailed written assignments (Please do not email papers *really* do not do this unless you are hospitalized and it is the only option.)
- I will NOT accept unstapled written assignments (Buy a stapler now)
- I will accept specific assignments on Blackboard.
- ACTING FOCUS PAPERS, 2 to 3 pages in length are due the following Monday after a show closes with a ticket stub stapled to the paper.
- READING RESPONSES to the text book and a play are required a one page response to each chapter typed handed in the day that the chapters or play is discussed.
- The acting projects will have a written assignment due on the day of performance.

- Mock Auditions 100 Pts (10% of your final grade)
- Written response to the two of the four UA Theatre productions in an Acting focus paper, 1 − 3 pages in length, 50 Points each, **100 Pts.** (You must pick the two show to write on, each show will be discussed and you are still required to see all four productions)
- Acting focus papers are DUE the Monday after each production closes with a ticket stub stapled to the paper.
- Reading, writing, and discussion assignments from text. 80 Pts total
- Written Response to Readings one page typed response for each chapter, eight total (10 Points per chapter)
- Contemporary Play Response **50 Points**
- (a two page written response to a play written after year 2005 and a short presentation)
- Test on Acting Terms 100 Points (10% of your final grade)

- Attendance, Professionalism & Participation 200 Points (20 % of your final grade)

**TH-141 Acting I:** (3 hours) *Prerequisite: Theatre major or minor.* The course is designed to introduce the beginning student to the art and craft of acting.

**Course Objectives:** The goal of Acting One is to become familiar with the basic principles of acting; in the world of theatre, through class exercises, assignments, observations, and applications. Using the voice, body, and mind to create characters and bring acting moments to life! The student will learn the steps involved in the process of acting and have to opportunity to apply this knowledge to acting assignments performed in class.

#### At the conclusion of the course the student will learn:

- The twenty steps of the Stanislavski system the student will explore the basic ingredients of acting; using contemporary material for scenes and monologues.
- The process involved in scene work and a monologue
- To create work in the community of the acting classroom, in pairs as group and individually as an actor.
- To develop, strengthen, and advance the actors' instrument of body, voice, and mind.
- To explore the craft and study of scene work and creating a character.
- To observe classmates work as actors and engage in discussions and feedback that reflects and articulates the process of acting.
