<u>Required Texts:</u> A Practical Handbook for the Actor by Bruder, Cohn, Olnek, Pollack, Previto and Ziegler Additionally, there will be three scripts needed for the class, *The Glass Menagerie* or *Eccentricities of a Nightingale, The Children's Hour* or *Little Foxes*. These scripts will be available at the University Bookstore, I also recommend checking the library.

Course Description: TH-441: (3 hours) thorough exploration of character study.

<u>Attendance policy:</u> Attendance is mandatory! After two unexcused absences. *Each additional absence will lower your final letter grade, by half of a letter grade (50 points).* Absences will not be excused without documentation and verifiable cause. My preference as an instructor is to be contacted **prior** to any absence by email. You must also contact your acting partner if you must be absent. Please consider the penalties of absences in relation to the class grade, before missing class. In this acting class your attendance and participation is mandatory, class exercises and projects are essential for your artistic enrichment. Remember if you are an absent actor in the professional world you will be replaced with another actor.

What this means is:

- After four absences total you cannot earn a grade higher than a B after 100 points are deducted from your total final points. (If you were working at an A level)
- After six absences total you cannot earn a grade higher than a C after 200 points are deducted from your total final points. (If you were working at an A level)
- To earn the total 100 points for attendance you must attend all classes, participate and be fully present.
- Each student is given two absences to be ill, have car trouble, and oversleep or to be somewhere else I do not excuse these items.
- Please contact me about your own hospitalization, a death in the family or religious holidays these must be verifiable for an excused absence. As well as any University documented absences.
- I will contact you if you are failing the class (this is often a result of too many absences or poor class work and conduct) and you will not be able to successfully complete the semester without a failing grade.

Tardiness: Three instances of lateness equal one absence. Please be on time this is crucial! Very Crucial!

Late or Missed work will not be accepted without prior notification and arrangements.

Performances are an important part of this class if you are not prepared to perform on a date that you are scheduled to perform, your final grade for late paper and performances will be lessened by 5 points each class period until completed or handed in.

- Approach stylized scene work with a scene partner
- Create and develop a character
- Use the rehearsal process and time effectively
- Make active bold choices as an actor
- Explore the physical and vocal life of the character in the world of the play
- Be familiar with at least three more plays
- Give and receive constructive feedback on the craft of acting
- Discuss and analyze scripts
- Breakdown a scene into beats and units
