<u>Course Description:</u> **TH-447 Stage Dialects (3 hours):** Study of stage dialects for the performer.

Course Objectives/ Learner Centered Outcomes: To become familiar with six dialects/accents. The student will learn how to approach working with dialects on stage as well as how to gather resources and for future dialects. Students will work on in-class exercises, drills and presentations.
